



How I spent Easter Week By Rev Jenny Cooper

Easter Week, bracing wind, some rain, noisy gulls, a fun fair, swimming pool, lively worship, Bible teaching and much more! I was at Spring Harvest at Skegness this year. I was with my daughter and son-in-law and their children with quite a large group of people from some Derby churches for the annual festival. This year there was a greater emphasis on the work of the Holy Spirit in the teaching. Each day the programme runs from 7.30am to midnight with choices to be made in each part of the day.



I decided that 9.00am was early enough for me this year going to the All Age 'Big Start, Boot Camp' with worship songs, a drama group telling Bible stories, dancing and fun. Then the children were off to their group, Whizz Kids, for the morning there were other groups for different ages.

There were two sessions in the morning with five choices before the break and four after the break. The theme for the programme across the site, and across the day was 'Up and Alive' and based around an exploration of St Paul's letter to the Ephesians. I choose to go to sessions hosted by 'Home for Good' one of the charities that partner with Spring Harvest.

Home for Good is a charity dedicated to finding a home for every child who needs one by co-ordinating and resourcing a rapidly growing network of people, churches and local movements across the UK who are raising awareness of the needs of vulnerable children and young people, inspiring individuals to explore fostering.

'Home for Good' launched an initiative at Spring harvest to find 38,000 people who would commit to pray for the 38,000 children who are likely to come into the care system this year. [a very sobering statistic]. Could you be one of those people?

The Bible Teaching stream that I choose was 'Thinking it Through' with Dr Chris Rogers a vicar in Bow, London the other was called 'Working it Out' with Dez Brown. The daily topics: Day 1 Wake up! Being alive in Christ; Day 2 The Armour of God. We had a uniformed Roman soldier as a visual aid but Chris wanted us to think bigger shared some interesting insights from the book of Isaiah and the armour of the Messiah and Taking Off and Putting On particular behaviours and Day 3 The Godly use of Power. Much still to process.

There is a book 'Up and Alive' by Cathy and Mark Madavan exploring the themes further. There was much for the family to enjoy in the afternoons with swimming, ice skating, funfair and the other delights of Butlins as well as a variety of seminars all the way from a Children's Choir to the Holy Spirit: God's purpose for the Church.

In the evenings there was an early Worship for everyone and then three different celebrations with speakers from different ministries I heard an inspiring story of a ministry which is active in 130 prisons across the country and indeed Spring Harvest was being live streamed into many of them. There is so much more to do and so many things to choose from but sleep and rest are needed too! I return encouraged and inspired each time I go.

Thy Kingdom Come 2024 9 – 19 May



'And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people.' Ephesians 6:18

Jenny Cooper writes: 'Thy Kingdom Come 'is a global prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray particularly in the season from Ascension Day to Pentecost for friends, neighbours and family to come to faith in Jesus Christ. I love the vision of people praying together in unity in hundreds of countries around the world. Will you again join this call to prayer in this season by praying for five people? There are resources that have been produced by TKC which will enable us to deepen our own discipleship and try fresh ways of praying.

There will be two booklets available in church: a Prayer Journal and a Novena. We have quite a lot of copies of the Prayer Journal, which is beautifully illustrated, and a modest number of the Novenas written by Bishop Anthony Poggo who is the Secretary General of the Anglican Communion. These resources, as well as others for adults and children, are also available for use online with the TKC app. You can also subscribe for a daily email. thykingdomcome@lambethpalace.org.uk

Here are ideas for individuals or groups

- Praying for five people who are not yet Christians -maybe have a piece of string in your pocket, or round your wrist with five knots to remind you to pray. Have you got a mug with a Bible verse which would remind you to pray every time you used it?
- Could you 'prayer walk' your street or your neighbourhood by yourself, with a friend, physically or virtually with a map. Your prayer could be as simple as 'Your Kingdom come, Your will be done'
- Have a prayer vigil.

We hope to set up some Prayer Stations at St Andrew's Hub on the Friday and Wednesday afternoons 15 and 17 May for people to visit and use as another way of praying for our parish. Updates on Interlink. Plus Citywide Prayer on Pentecost Sunday Evening – 19 May at 6.30pm at The Reach Centre on Pride Park – an opportunity to pray with other Christians from across the city – we encourage all at St Peter's to attend. The usual online prayer meeting that evening will not take place to release as many people as possible to Reach.



Littleover Historical Society

How lovely to see the horse trough in the hollow, once more looking lovely and clean and the surrounding foliage cut down and tidy! This is one of our Grade II listed in the Derbyshire Historic Environment Record, very often overlooked unlike the Thatched Cottage also in the Hollow, and also Grade II listed, depicted in many paintings and a prominent subject of Richard Keene the photographer.




The cottage, constructed late 16th to early 17th century, was the home of the Yeoman or manager of the Old Hall estate, for many years it was a wayside Inn, and later the home of Walter Haynes, the village hedge cutter. Other noted Grade II listed buildings in Littleover: St Peter's Church, and War Memorial; 11,15,17 and 19 Shepherd Street; 45 Church Street; Derby Grammar School; 15 Normanton Lane and Rykneld Lodge.

Home Group Study and Sermon Series

This summer we will be considering 'Growing Older and Wiser' – something that we may feel we are doing well, while others may feel the older outweighs wiser. The studies consider how wider society celebrates youth and sees old age as a joke, making the prospect of growing older something of burden. But ageing is always better than the alternative which is much more final.

Through Sunday sermons and the home group studies that follow we will consider: what does it mean to be wise; how we listen to younger people; when the children are grown ups too; exploring the eternal wisdom of God; finding our purpose when our bodies are less active.

We hope that this will be an informative series that will help us to see the world through one another's eyes and lives.

The transformation that followed was nothing short of miraculous. Freed from the shackles of addiction, 'C' rediscovered his zest for life. No longer haunted by fear, he embraced each day with a newfound sense of purpose and joy. Volunteering at his local church, tending to the garden with a smile on his face, 'C' embodies the resilience of the human spirit.

For us at Derby City Mission, 'C's journey is more than just a success story; it's a testament to the power of compassion and solidarity. Every life we touch, every heart we heal, reaffirms our commitment to serving those in need and spreading the light of hope in our community.

His DCM Support Worker said: "It has been an absolute privilege to help and watch 'C' completely transform his life. He has gone from someone who was sad, lonely, terrified, addicted and hopeless to a man who is smiley, positive, kind, confident, thankful, thoughtful, loving and bursting with hope."
