
Emma to go on Placement

Jean Burgess to become a Bishop

The Venerable Jean Burgess, currently Archdeacon of Bournemouth will soon become Bishop of Grimsby, suffragan to the Diocese of Lincoln.

Jean was born in Derby and worked as a nurse for many years. She was a member of St Peter's in the late 1990s and early 2000s before her ordination in 2003 (along with Alicia). Her curacy was in Church Gresley and then she became interim minister and then vicar at St Alkmund's on Kedleston Road.



She also served as Dean of Women in Derby between 2013-2018, during which time General Synod voted to consecrate women as Bishops. In 2018 she became Archdeacon of Bolton before moving to Bournemouth in 2023 and her announcement as Bishop of Grimsby was made in December at Grimsby Minister (where former St Peter's curate Rev Andrew Race is now Vicar!).



Jean said: "I am deeply honoured and excited to be joining the Diocese of Lincoln. Having spent my ministry serving in a variety of communities, I am very much looking forward to getting to know the people and places which make the diocese so special.

I once heard a former Archbishop of Canterbury say, 'It's all about Jesus', and that has been the central calling of my vocational journey. My heart is for building relationships, listening to stories, and working together to see our communities seek God's Kingdom and flourish. "

Jean will be consecrated Bishop at Southwark Cathedral (London Bridge SE1 9DA) on Friday 6 February at 11am before she moves up to Lincolnshire and is officially installed.

Jean is married to Graham and they have three children and six grandchildren.

Our prayers are with Jean and all the family during this time of change and transition.

Jasper Visits Derby

From Wendy Gretton: “Thank you to all the faithful members of St Peter’s Church who have been praying for this young man over the last few years.

Jasper and his mum, Robyn flew over to the UK for Christmas and they are hoping to stay for a year. This would not have seemed possible once, however we must never underestimate the power of prayer. Jasper had his final “childhood” MRI, just before leaving Australia, it showed him fit to travel.



He first became ill when he was only three years old, the medical team did not know why he was failing to grow and thrive. They discovered a very rare brain tumour, known only to about eight other children in the world. He has battled the brain tumour, countless tests, stays in hospital, a stroke, surgeries, chemo and procedures over the past fifteen years. He has just finished school, something we may never have thought possible.

It was a real joy for Robyn to accompany us to church on Christmas morning to say thanks to God and to all of you. I am unsure as to her depth of faith, but I do know how very grateful she is for the love and prayers you have all shared. Sadly, Jasper could not join us, unfortunately he spent the whole day, ill in bed! He missed the turkey, crackers, silly jokes and games, but maybe that was his plan, Christmas in the UK is so different to Australia! Not least the temperature....

Please do continue praying for them as neither knows what the future may bring. What I did witness though, was the strain of caring for a sick child (whatever their age or size!), so please include Robyn in your prayers, constantly having to check the welfare of her son.

They left us to celebrate Hogmanay in Scotland, looking for snow, which I know they found, and maybe now regret! They were also able to enjoy train travel when there are no available seats, I left them sitting on the floor for the duration of their journey.



Ash Wednesday: Mourning our sins

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. But why 'Ash' Wednesday? The reason has to do with getting things right between you and God, and the tradition goes right back to the Old Testament.

In the Old Testament, the Israelites often sinned. When they finally came to their senses, and saw their evil ways as God saw them, they could do nothing but repent in sorrow. They mourned for the damage and evil they had done. As part of this repentance, they covered their heads with ashes. For the Israelites, putting ashes on your head, and even rending your clothes, was an outward sign of their heart-felt repentance and acknowledgement of sin. (See Genesis 18:27; 2 Samuel 13:19; Job 2:8, 30:19; Isaiah 58:5; Jeremiah 6:26; Jonah 3:6)

In the very early Christian Church, the yearly 'class' of penitents had ashes sprinkled over them at the beginning of Lent. They were turning to God for the first time, and mourning their sins. But soon many other Christians wanted to take part in the custom, and to do so at the very start of Lent. They heeded Joel's call to 'rend your hearts and not your garments' (Joel 2:12-19). Ash Wednesday became known as either the 'beginning of the fast' or 'the day of the ashes'.

The collect for Ash Wednesday goes back to the Prayer Book, and it stresses the penitential character of the day. It encourages us with the reminder of the readiness of God to forgive us and to renew us.

The Bible readings for this day are often Joel 2:1-2, 12-18, Matthew 6: 1-6, 16-21 and Paul's moving catalogue of suffering, "as having nothing and yet possessing everything." (2 Corinthians 5:20b - 6:10)

The actual custom of 'ashing' was abolished at the Reformation, though the old name for the day remained. Today, throughout the Church of England, receiving the mark of ashes on one's forehead is optional. Certainly, the mark of ashes on the forehead reminds people of their mortality: "Remember that you are dust and to dust you will return..." (Genesis 3:19)

The late medieval custom was to burn the branches used on Palm Sunday in the previous year in order to create the ashes for today.





Creation Care

Eco Church and Our Churchyard: Supporting Nature in 2026

The PCC has confirmed that the Creation Care Team will continue leading our work toward achieving the A Rocha Eco Church awards. A key part of this effort is the Land and Nature category, which recognises how churches can contribute to the UK's goal of protecting 30% of land for nature by 2030.

The 2023 State of Nature report highlights the urgency of this mission: the UK remains one of the world's most nature-depleted countries, with nearly one in six species at risk of disappearing. As climate change and biodiversity loss accelerate, caring for our own green spaces has never been more important.

To play our part, we are developing a Churchyard Land Management Plan. This will help us create space where wildlife can thrive, while also organising and prioritising our approach to biodiversity. It is also a requirement for achieving the Eco Church Gold Award.

Thank you to everyone who responded to the recent congregation survey. Although the number of replies was small, clear themes emerged: the importance of keeping paths and access to graves tidy, alongside enthusiasm for introducing more wildflowers and shrubs to support pollinators and other wildlife.

Churchyard Land Management: Our Commitment to Nature

The PCC recognises the important role churches can play in helping the UK reach its goal of protecting 30% of land for nature by 2030. Guided by A Rocha UK's Target 25 project, we will focus on supporting declining species and habitats, particularly wildflowers, bees, butterflies, swifts and grassland.

To encourage biodiversity, mowing will be managed carefully, including intentionally leaving some "untidy" areas such as the eastern boundary on Normanton Lane, where nettles will be retained for wildlife. We will continue to manage trees responsibly, remove self-sown saplings, and support healthy soils by installing compost bins at the south end of the churchyard. We will also explore collecting rainwater to reduce mains water use. No Mow May will continue, and we will look into Let It Bloom June to vary grass lengths.

A detailed map of designated areas will be available, supported by clear professional signage and regular updates on the church website. Physical work will offer opportunities for both the congregation and wider community to get involved, with plans to connect with local wildlife groups. Baseline surveys will track progress, and the Land Management Plan will be reviewed annually.

One of our new Mission Partners, our Creation Care team have already been working with them to facilitate the work we are doing here in Littleover to care for God's glorious creation.

The Christian Ecology link was formed in 1982 and in 2015 the name changed to Green Christian and with the following aims:

- To offer insights into ecology and the environment to Christian people and churches
- To offer Christian insights to the Green movement.

The basis of faith is "Our belief in God as Creator of all things and in Jesus Christ as Lord, looking to the Holy Spirit for guidance through the Scriptures, and seeking to hear the Spirit in the challenges of the present time."

Members of Green Christian come from across denominations as well as working alongside other Christian environmental groups such as Operation Noah, Eco Church and Eco-Congregation Scotland.

Green Christian is a group of ordinary Christians from all backgrounds and traditions. Inspired by our faith, we care for creation through prayer, action and encouragement. Whether you are a church leader or church leaver, a campaigner or contemplative, a worrier or warrior, GC can help you be a change-maker in your church, your country or just your own life. Volunteer-led there are now over 1000 members. Helping to support those who are timid and discouraged as much as those who are confident and keen.

So why care for Creation?

“In the first creation narrative, we see God’s delight in what is made. There are several things in this chapter that are worth taking note of because they encourage us towards what we are calling “creation care”.

Let’s notice the refrain of “it was good” and alongside those phrases like, “Let the water teem...” and “Be fruitful and increase in number and fill the water in the seas ... on the earth”. What we take from these is that God delights in the abundance and variations and if God delights in that varied abundance, then we might do well to delight in it too. More: we honour God’s delight by seeking to guard and sustain that varied abundance. A further implication is that we diminish something that God values if we allow conditions that lead to extinctions and loss of thriving. This would be the reverse of glorifying God. Glorifying God would, by the implication of this chapter, involve working to sustain and renew the life of the earth.

In Genesis 2:15, we’re told that the Lord God placed the human in the garden to work it and keep it. This seems to be a human vocation that extends beyond the garden.

In deeper reflection of this verse, we might notice a few more things. For example, some commentators suggest the word “earthling” is a better translation than the English “human”. Used earlier in the chapter, the related word “*adamah*” is usually translated as “earth” or even “soil”. In verse 7, we see that this earthling figure is breathed into life from the shaped dust of the earth. This reminds us that we take our being from the same material as the planet we creation; our very molecules are shared with stars, seas and savannahs and all that lives from them. At the very least, caring for creation is by extension a form of self-interest!




