From the Vicarage

Dear Friends

Political tensions seemed to have dominated our newsfeeds over recent months. Whether it is the polarised debates in America or issues around refugees here in the UK – it seems that it only brings out the worst in us.

Our history is beset with such narratives, we hold heartfelt and passionate beliefs and when cornered, will rise to defend what we believe is right. But does such defence make it right to denigrate and tear down other people? It is right to make our needs more important than the needs and rights of others?

I wonder what prompts us to do this? Is it because modern media gives us access to a broad selection of arguments and we latch on to the one that speaks to us the loudest. Or is it our own insecurity that our comfort is being threatened and so the 'others' must stop, stay away, be quiet, so that we may feel safe once again?

A word cropped up the other day that I had not heard for a long time – propaganda. Maybe now it's called 'spin' or 'PR' but the reality is that any media reporting, or personal comment can fall into the danger of leaning heavily away from fact and into painting a situation to our own advantage.

Such situations are as old as the hills – or the playground – but when there is a calculated effort to re-frame a situation to our own advantage – particularly political – then it falls into the reality of propaganda. And here lies danger on so many levels.

As Christians we ask God to give us wisdom to interpret the world around us with eyes that are firmly fixed on God's truth. Where is God's truth in a given situation? Where are his principles of justice and equity? How does He respond with grace and compassion?

We run into dangerous territory when we condemn those with whom we don't agree. Or indeed use Christianity as a weapon to target others. God calls us to love our neighbour as ourselves, not just those with whom we feel an affinity. Now more than ever we need to proclaim a Gospel of love to a confused and polarised world.

Can I encourage us to pray for our community, our city, nation and wider world – that we may view one another with God's tender heart of love. And that we seek to be peacemakers in the midst of anger and dissention.

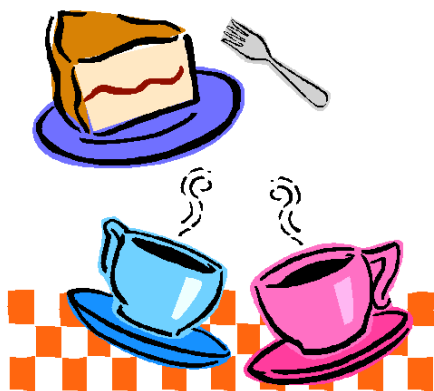

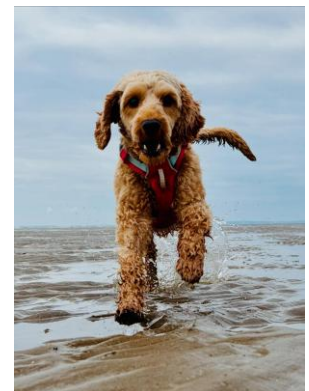

Littleover Village

Littleover Historical Society

Villages in Derbyshire continued to have part-time parish constables, until the mid-1870's even after Derbyshire County police was formed in 1857. It was the duty of the Littleover Parish constable to keep order in the village, Constable Lane was previously called constable field and measured two acres in size. This land may have provided an early means of reimbursing the village policeman.

The duties of the village constable included keeping the peace; apprehending felons and making hue-and-cry; punishing idle persons often by whipping or committing to the stocks; tax collection and executing warrants issued by the Justice of the Peace.



(In the book written by, A.B.Scott, he locates the stocks as being at the junction of what was then, New Road, now, Old Hall Road, and Church Street, under a vast Walnut tree.

Anna Chaplaincy Proposal to PCC

At the time of writing we are preparing for an exciting proposal that will come to the St Peter's PCC on Tuesday 30 September. That proposal is to employ a half-time chaplain to older people across our community in Littleover and Blagreaves – an Anna Chaplain.

What is an Anna Chaplain?

The Anna Chaplaincy is a network of chaplains to older people supported and trained by BRF Ministries (who also support Messy Church). Anna Chaplains are appointed and authorised by, and sent out under the authority of, their local church.

Their main purpose is to:

- Offer spiritual support to older people who are living in care homes, sheltered housing complexes and on their own, and to their relatives and staff who look after them.
- Promote the spiritual welfare of older people in the wider community, particularly those facing challenges living independently.

Anna Chaplain, as a title, was chosen by BRF Ministries for its echoes of Anna, the widow and faithful older person who, together with Simeon, recognised the baby Jesus as the Messiah and fulfilment of God's promises in Luke's Gospel (Luke 2:36-38).

Why an Anna Chaplain?

People in our communities are growing older. The census in 2021 showed us that around 19% of people in Littleover and Blagreaves were 65 years old or older, and over a quarter of them were living alone. The Bible asks us to honour and value those who are older (Leviticus 19:32). It reminds us that there is wisdom in those who have lived longer (Job 12:12; Proverbs 20:29) and the Old Testament law provides especially for the widow as well as the orphan (Deuteronomy 24:17ff).



Working with Anna Friends

Each Anna Chaplain is encouraged to develop a small team of *Anna Friends*. They serve alongside an Anna Chaplain as a team, demonstrating the same qualities needed for this sensitive ministry, but are usually individuals who prefer not to take on a leadership role or offer as much time per week. Our vision would be that there might be those from our congregation at St Peter's who may be called to work alongside an Anna Chaplain as Anna Friends.

How would an Anna Chaplain be funded?

The proposal is that the Anna Chaplain would be half-time and would be employed for up to five years. We estimate the cost of this post to be just around £108,000. This is a lot of money, but St Peter's Church recently received the Ashmore Bequest, generously given 'to facilitate the Church in its activities, social and missional and to ensure the whole of the community has suitable access and transport when required'. This proposal is designed to be a part of meeting that need, and a part of the Ashmore Bequest would fund the Anna Chaplaincy project at St Peter's.

Please pray for the PCC as they consider the proposal and as we seek to meet the needs of our older generation in the community.

Janet Guy

Janet Mary Guy was born in June 1944 to Doreen and Joseph Ashmore, baby sister to Robert in Market Warsop near Mansfield. Their home was near a railway line and a German bomb landed the other side of line, blowing out all the windows and showering Janet with glass in her crib, but leaving her unscathed.



She attended Sherwood Hall School for Girls and excelled in her education, leaving to study English at Manchester University followed by teacher training at Durham. Her first teaching role was at the Royal School for the Deaf in Derby before moving to Derby High School for Girls as a primary teacher.

Living in Mansfield but working in Derby during the week was a challenge with transport and through friends at the Baptist Mission Hall in Mansfield she met Sidney Guy who had just got a job at British Rail in Derby, and even better, he had a car. So each week they would travel together and their relationship blossomed and they were married in August 1970. In 1973 they moved to Richmond Avenue and this was their home for the rest of their lives. Janet said that early on he was the lively one and helped her out of her shyness.

While they never had children of their own, they were very supportive of neices and nephews as well as friends and neighbours. Her work at school also brought great joy and Carol, a former colleague said: "Janet was a very private person, a listener rather than a chatterbox but her input was always relevant and sensible. Janet once confided in me that she would have rather been a librarian than a teacher. Her love of literature was passed on to her pupils. I have many happy memories of our years together".

Sidney and Janet also enjoyed many holidays together, made easier with his free rail passes and they had some favourite places like North Wales, the Yorkshire Coast as well as Bournemouth and Eastborne. And there were always plenty of photographs and postcards to mark the adventures.

They were both faithful Christians and originally attended St Peter's in the City before joining St Peter's here in Littleover. Sydney was traditional in his views and they preferred the quiet of the 8am service. Sadly, Sidney died in April 2021 and while Janet missed him very much, she made sure she wasn't stuck at home alone but took every opportunity to be out and with others. She joined Bill and Maggie's homegroup and took over collecting the money at lunchclub, where she was always a welcoming face for newcomers.

At our Wednesday morning service she became part of the refreshment team and also became a regular attender at the Sunday Morning service. While this may have been a bit out of her comfort zone, a band, the screen, modern songs, noisier and busier than our other services – but Janet wanted to be in the heart of the whole church family. And she settled right in. Got to know a bigger group of people, shared stories, prayed faithfully and became a much loved and cherished member of our church. And always with her hat on in church – she said she felt called by God to wear one for worship, and through the years He hadn't told her any different, so she continued to wear a variety of different hats depending on the weather.

Janet's life was authentic, loving, prayerful and kind. Her death has been a shock, but her eternity is with Christ and her legacy of faithful, generous love will remain with us in a myriad of different ways.

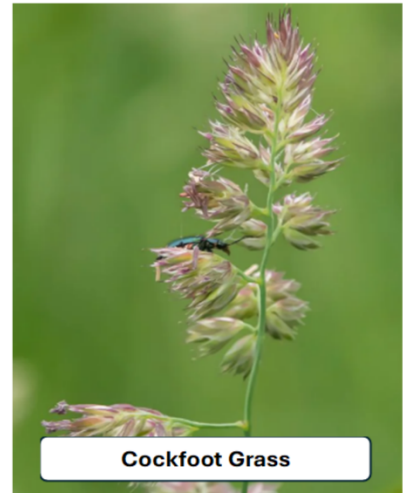

Creation Care

Nurturing Nature: Caring for Creation in Our Churchyard

A pivotal Creation Care objective has been to formulate a Churchyard Management Plan to support biodiversity of species. To help us with that we asked for advice from Derbyshire Wildlife Trust. (DWT).

A DWT Nature Recovery Assistant joined the Creation Care team earlier in the year for a walk around the churchyard. At the time we were in No Mow May. Whilst areas remain unmown, they also offer food, and habitat benefits for other wildlife including a range of invertebrates, birds and small mammals. The nectar and pollen supports bees, butterflies and other pollinators.

The soil at the bottom end of the Churchyard, where the cut grass is left to rot, is enriched and has many nettles. Nettles support butterflies, moths, aphids, and ladybirds and their flowers provide nectar and pollen for bees and other pollinators.

On a short walk along the footpaths, 28 different species of grass and flowering plant were observed. A formal survey would be expected to reveal many more. A list of the species, with some colour images is displayed on the Creation Care noticeboard in the refreshment area of church. We will start some surveys in spring/summer 2026.

Our bird nestboxes are sited in the more established trees. Doted around are some self-sown saplings that are damaging graves and will need to be removed.

Many of the graves are still tended and we need to maintain access to them. We hope to encourage some volunteers to assist with maintaining some of the other currently untended graves.

We want to encourage the community to consider the Churchyard as a site to enjoy nature whilst respecting the memories of loved ones buried or remembered there.

Jan Jackson wins Civic Award

Fourteen unsung Derby people – including Littleover's own Jan Jackson, have been recognised for their outstanding contributions to the wellbeing, reputation and life of the city in this year's relaunched Derby Civic Awards.

They were honoured in a special ceremony held in the city's Council Chamber at the Council House in September, watched by a large number of the city's councillors.

Derby Telegraph reported: Jan Jackson, chair of Littleover Grange Hall Community Association and founder of Littleover in Bloom. Her citation read: "Jan has led numerous community initiatives including award-winning floral displays,

local history and Tai-Chi classes, significantly enhancing life in Littleover."

Ms Jackson responded: "I have been involved with the association for 30 years. We have been successful over time with the Littleover in Bloom competition in the East Midlands with a Silver Gilt award in the Urban Community category last year and in 2023 and 2022, also a best front garden award, and best pub or hotel in 2022."

Littleover first entered the Bloom campaign in 2009 under the guidance of Ms Jackson and in 2022 she was given an East Midlands in Bloom Committee Award for her work. She was said to have worked "tirelessly to improve her area, drumming up volunteer support from various groups throughout the community and local businesses. The improvement Littleover in Bloom has made to this urban community has been impressive and continues to this day due to her enthusiasm and determination."

Greenbelt Festival – what happens?

“Over the August Bank Holiday weekend, Richard and I set off on our nearly annual pilgrimage to Greenbelt: place of intellectual, emotional and spiritual plenty.

It is a festival celebrating the arts and faith, with a desire to encourage its community to think about issues of social justice, to explore the theology of these things and to take action.



Taking place in the beautiful grounds of Boughton House, near Kettering there are a dozen or so marquees hosting talks, performance, workshops, and you can jump between them, giving yourself an eclectic mix. This year I was moved by Scottish theologian John Philip Newell drawing on the Celtic wisdom tradition to talk about seeing all of creation (and all people) as the expression of God: the world was not formed out of nothing, but out of the substance of God. Also inspiring was Adjoa Andoh (Lady Danbury from ‘Bridgerton’) – talking about her path into acting and what’s important to her in the projects she does. What a fantastic woman – who knew she is a reader in the Church of England?

Beth Alison Barr and Chine McDonald talked about womanhood – how portrayals of women in the bible have been interpreted through the ages: in medieval times, Mary was portrayed as a strong, powerful figure – Queen of Heaven. How is she portrayed now? White? A helper to Joseph? Only as a mother? How does this reflect or impact our theology of women’s standing and place today?

There were talks and discussions about Israel-Palestine, food banks, prayer, community organising, inclusion in our churches, how we bank and save for our pensions, artificial intelligence and much more.

Throughout the days and evenings, there are bands playing, singers singing, DJs DJing. There is performance theatre - drama, dance, circus, comedy. There is poetry - such a powerful medium that can also be completely joyous. You can dance, play sport, and do arty crafty stuff – plenty for young families to do together. There is opportunity to worship - the whole festival pauses to join in one holy communion service on Sunday morning, and there are opportunities through the weekend to join in other forms of worship – Forest church, Iona liturgies, and alt-Goth.

Some people go to the festival for the day, some camp (or glamp) on site for the weekend, others stay in more robust accommodation nearby. One of the things that I love about Greenbelt is that it gives a glimpse of how other people live out their Christian faith, including those who do so in a very different way to me. Brought up with Anglican liturgy, and having viewed life through an evangelical lens, over the years Greenbelt has enriched and widened my horizons, my thinking and my understanding of who God is and who we are.

The Ashmore Bequest Team

You may recall that we were left a substantial bequest to bless the work of the church – especially in improving access for those who would otherwise struggle to attend.

The Purpose of the Ashmore Bequest is stated to:

“Facilitate the Church in its activities, social and missional and to ensure the whole of the community has suitable access and transport when required.”

A group of people appointed from the PCC now form the Ashmore Bequest Team and consider any proposals that may wish to be considered for funding. See earlier in the magazine for the more recent idea regarding an Anna Chaplain.

However, there are a number of ideas that we could progress very quickly, but we need help to put together all the costings and permissions required to get things moving. And these are mainly capital or building projects. The difficulty is that our Fabric Team have plenty of other challenges in looking after all our buildings and they do not have capacity to take on these additional projects. Current ideas include:

- St Peter's Hub – chair/wheelchair lift to disabled toilet, to allow for access without going outside to the ramp
- Refreshment of the Hub car park, new handrails by the footpaths
- Creation of proper spaces at the Hub for cars with a blue badge
- St Peter's Church – new handrail for East End steps and lighting to ensure safer access at night, including Church Street entrance.



One of the successful uses of the funds was the operation of a free taxi service, to and from the church and hub – this has been a real blessing to those attending services and clubs, particularly Lunch Club. The Bible Society

Four ways you can welcome a refugee

The number of long-term arrivals to Britain in a single year is approaching a million. As witnesses to the gospel and people known by their love, we can't ignore those who are new to our communities.



How should we respond to what we're hearing every day in the news? Maybe you are part of a large church that's been at the forefront of welcoming people with an excellent range of programmes. If that isn't you, however, and you're wondering what you can do, we asked our friends at Welcome Churches for the best ways to welcome new neighbours.

1 Break the ice and say hello

This is where it starts. Greeting someone is acknowledging their existence and that they happen to be present in your space, so it's the simplest Christian action. In the good Samaritan parable, the priest and the Levite preferred not to acknowledge the injured traveller. They weren't even willing to break the ice between them.

This applies both outside the church and inside. Even a brief greeting to someone you don't know, in an icy situation where people are ignoring each other, can mean a lot. At church, it's a matter of health in the body of Christ. With diversity can come division. People will cluster in cultures and languages, and somebody needs to step out of their cluster and into someone else's if the body is going to be what it should be.

2 Include refugees in everything

When people who are new to this country come to your church, it's either because you've invited them or they've heard about you. But you can be praying for them long before that happens. If immigration and the asylum system is a major issue in our society then make sure the individuals involved have a place in your prayers.

Once you have refugees joining you on Sundays, try to get them into your weekday activities. If they're still applying for asylum, they'll have an enormous time to fill, which is a much more serious thing than we realise. If they have their refugee status and they're able to work, we as churches want to support them as they integrate into our communities. Full participation in church life is a big help there.

Where language is a barrier, as in a Bible study, don't forget that food and hospitality are a universal language. If you can't say much more in words than hello and your name, a cup of coffee or a meal will provide a wonderful way to connect.

3 Join Welcome Churches

If your church has been welcoming lots of refugees then you must have learned things that could be a great benefit to other churches. But you might also be one of those other churches who are eager to learn. Whichever one you are, joining the network of Welcome Churches will increase your impact among refugees.

Welcome Churches has been bringing together congregations that want to love their new neighbours since 2018.

4 Give the Bible to a refugee

In Britain we can freely own Bibles and share them with each other. That might not be true of the place a refugee came from, so God's word is an exceptionally precious gift. It's undoubtedly the best start to their new life in this country. You can put the Bible in the hands of a refugee today by donating to Bible Society's outreach across England and Wales.

Bible Society in Ukraine A thousand Bibles a day

Three and a half years of war with Russia has made the Bible a part of daily life in Ukraine. The demand among Ukrainians to get hold of God's word is huge, and Bible Society supporters in this country are helping to meet it.

Anatoliy, who leads the Bible Society team in Kyiv, visited recent bombing sites and prayed with rescue teams and the families of survivors. When he's not taking Bibles to soldiers on the front lines or visiting the wounded in hospital, this is what he does. 'I prayed passionately from my heart,' Anatoliy says. "God, show your mercy to these crying parents because they have so much expectation for a miracle."

People are receiving Jesus

How do Anatoliy and the team endure this? They have faith, but they're also seeing faith begin and grow in people around them. Last week, Anatoliy gave a Bible to a soldier in his 50s who said, 'God heard my prayer. I received my Bible.'
